The Buck Starts Here

A powerful one dollar bill brought the Tulsa SPCA pets several new friends and a surprising fundraiser. Maebry Smith is a second-grade student at Metro Christian Academy.

Recognized for her kindness to others, she was selected to represent her class in an annual school project designed to raise awareness of the impact of standing up for what you believe to be important. Students chosen as class leaders were given a one dollar bill with instructions to

bring blessings to another without help from parents at work places or relatives with monetary means.

Maebry immediately declared the Tulsa SPCA as her mission as she is an avid visitor to the organization's Facebook page and checks nightly to see pictures of the adopted pets that have found new homes.

Ideas for ways to expand the dollar began flying, and eventually a plan was formed to contact family and friends asking that they match her dollar. In addition, each would be supplied with the Tulsa SPCA Wish List of items needed at the shelter. Maebry brought contagious enthusiasm to the project which resulted in 25 contributors who donated dog leashes, collars, pet treats and toys with a combined estimated value of \$250, and cash donations totaling \$136.



Networking with the Tulsa SPCA also resulted in an opportunity for some of Maebry's Girl Scout Troop to spend volunteer hours at the shelter helping with various daily chores. They learned about socializing pets for adoption and watched a demonstration of

the intake process for new and incoming pets. The girls were able to earn credit for their Pet Care Badges.

A dollar bill and one second grader with a love of animals and the motivation to help needy pets equals the Power of One!



A Letter From Mindy...

Dear Tulsa SPCA Patrons.

Thank you all so much for your continued support throughout the year. We wouldn't exist without caring, generous people like you. The last six months have been busy at the Tulsa SPCA, and I'm excited to share a few thoughts with you.

Our adoption and intake numbers continue to rise as we begin 2015. As we evaluate and refine our procedures we hope to continue increasing the number of animals we're able to save. Our low cost vaccination clinic is also gearing up for a busy year. Although there is no substitute for having a regular veterinarian, we hope this clinic offers pet parents an inexpensive option for making sure their furry family members are protected against the preventable conditions and diseases they may encounter. We continue to look for opportunities to get our adoptable animals, services and information into the community and plan on increasing our presence around Tulsa over the next year.

We were humbled to be able to work side-by-side with so many to help our Sand Springs neighbors deal with the aftermath of the tornado. The many animals we were able to save were a result of agencies like Tulsa Animal Welfare, Amore Pit Bull Rescue, The Tulsa County Sheriff's Department, Sand Springs Animal Control, the Humane Society of Tulsa and dedicated individual rescuers working together to make a difference. It was wonderful to be able to rescue animals and reunite so many families.

I have continued to be surprised by many things over my first year at the Tulsa SPCA. Although they're all important and have taught me important lessons, I want to share one in particular with you.

We've all seen or heard the sad stories of some rescues. Puppies thrown out of a moving car, kittens sealed in a box to die, dogs with embedded collars, etc. These are awful, they break our heart, and sadly they are all things that have really happened. However, those are not the majority of the animals we see at the shelter. The animals at the Tulsa SPCA come from four main sources. First, we have LOTS of owner surrenders. While there are many reasons for this, a few of the more common are, "I'm moving and I can't take my pet", or "We have a new baby and don't have the time/are worried about how they'll

get along", or "Someone in the house has developed allergies", or even "I just can't afford to care for my

pet anymore". Second, stray animals must go to the City Shelter first for legal and other reasons so we pull from local, high-kill facilities. Third, animals are sometimes surrendered to our Cruelty Investigator. Finally, we participate in rescues from puppy mill and hoarding situations. We try to keep a good balance between these sources and have no problem keeping our kennels and cat room full!

Most of the time, the animals we see are just like your dog or cat. As a matter of fact, it's estimated that about 25% of the animals in shelters are purebred. So while we tend to talk a lot about the sad cases, the majority of the animals available to adopt at the Tulsa SPCA are just your average, every day dog or cat who through no fault of their own need a new human to love. Current statistics tell us only about 29% of dogs and cats in homes were rescued from shelters. Animals from most shelters (including ours) will come vaccinated, spayed/neutered, microchipped, checked for health and temperament issues and with current preventatives (flea, tick, heartworm, etc.) Each year, 31% of dogs and 41% of cats entering shelters around the country will be euthanized. By choosing to adopt from a shelter as opposed to a breeder or Craigslist or some other resource you will not only receive a wonderful new, healthy family member, you will also save two lives - that of the animal you adopt, as well as the one we can now intake thanks to an open space in the shelter.

The small adoption fee we charge allows us to make sure animals go to a good home and also make sure we send a healthy animal home. Every time we see a box of puppies outside of the grocery store, or read an ad on Craigslist or hear about another unwanted litter, it breaks our hearts because we know it means more animals will be euthanized due to pet overpopulation. Please help us spread the word and adopt, don't shop!




Red, White, Blue & Rescue Trivia Night = Success

nets, really animals in general, are a huge part of our lives. Since the 1970s, pet ownership in our country has tripled to the point where over 60% of households own at least one pet. We spend more money on food for our animals than we do on baby

food and actually have more pets in this country than we do children! In fact, in the United States, a child is more likely to have a pet than a liveat-home father.

Numerous studies point to the physical, emotional and social benefits pets provide. In addition, abuse of pets is often a stepping stone to domestic violence, bullying and other issues. Animal abuse investigations are often the first contact law enforcement and subsequently social services have with a family in crisis.

In one study, researchers found more than 70% of women entering shelters reported their abusers had threatened, injured or killed family pets for revenge or as a way to control the female and/or children in the home. Seventy percent of animal abusers have also been found to have records for other crimes. A history of pet abuse is one of the

top four indicators of who is at risk for becoming a batterer, and is often seen in association with other serious crimes including drugs, gang activity, weapons and sexual assault. Up to 40% of women delay leaving abusive situations because they

worry about what will happen to their pets.

Children exposed to animal abuse and in their homes

can become offenders themselves. Sometimes these kids are acting out what was done to them, taking out their feelings the way they've observed or sadly, sometimes they try to kill their pet "humanely" to prevent additional suffering. Animal abuse is frequently the first step in a cycle of violence that we need to

stop. In order to help address issues like these. the Tulsa SPCA is happy to be working with local and national agencies to find solutions.

In addition to encouraging law enforcement and social services to recognize

the seriousness of animal abuse, the Tulsa SPCA is committed to educating, assisting and improving

our community, both animal and human. There are many ideas about how to reduce violence in our society. and just as many trying to identify the cause. Some studies point to a decline in empathy which is linked to behaviors such as bullying, abuse and neglect.

Red Rover, a group working to build empathy among kids, says, "Kids' connections with pets are often the first relationships in their lives they have any control over." Animals can easily teach children about forming bonds, caring for others, maintaining positive relationships and friendships, learning leadership and problemsolving skills, and much more.

Look for us in the community working with partners to raise awareness about animals and the role they play in our lives.
