The second annual PAWsh Palaces fundraising event started on Saturday, Nov. 2, looking very different than last year's. Six palaces were displayed at Southern Agriculture locations in Tulsa and surrounding communities.

The public was invited to vote for their favorite dog house or pet furniture. Each \$5 vote entered the donor to win the house for which they voted.

Voting took place online at tulsaspca.org/pawshvoting through Saturday, Dec. 7, at midnight.

This event was developed to help us improve the lives of dogs and cats and their human companions — dogs like Sheldon (pictured above).

Sheldon lived his life on a chain without proper shelter or protection until the Tulsa SPCA cruelty investigator Tim Geen rescued him in June. Despite the Tulsa SPCA's efforts to promote awareness, dogs like Sheldon are forced to suffer outside in the sweltering heat of summer or the deep freeze of winter.

One way we promoted awareness of the life-saving importance of pet shelters was our annual PAWsh Palaces event — a collaborative effort between our agency, Tulsa architecture firms, builders and two student groups.

This competition celebrated innovative design and our family pets.

These teams came together to design one-of-a-kind doghouses and indoor pet furniture.

## Q: What made you want to become a volunteer at the Tulsa SPCA?

## Q: What do you like most about volunteering with the Tulsa SPCA?

Just being around the animals and knowing that I can make their day better is the most rewarding experience I could ask for.

## Q: Talk about your recent experience of adopting an animal from the Tulsa SPCA.

I recently was given the one thing I've been asking for since early this summer. All I've wanted is to adopt a dog. After months of begging and convincing my mother, she finally agreed to let me get one! I knew which dog I wanted instantly. Her name was originally Esme, now Aspen. She is a terrier/lab/poodle mix and is seven-years-old. She is perfect. We needed an older dog due to me leaving for college soon and my mom being gone most of the day. She fits right in!



## Q: Why would you encourage others to get involved/be a volunteer for the Tulsa SPCA?

## A Desperate Need

The Tulsa SPCA rescues a pit mix dog who nearly starved to death after being abandoned for 6 weeks

Through September of 2019, the Tulsa SPCA has taken in 959 animals and placed 918. We've spayed or neutered 2,847 dogs and cats, provided 10,572 vaccinations and 1,499 microchips, investigated 649 cruelty complaints and distributed over 11,500 lbs. of food to 964 animals in need, as well as provided assistance during the historic flooding this spring and much more.

"The work we do every year is important," executive director Mindy Tiner said. "But this year the Tulsa SPCA's impact reached new levels."

One of the animals the Tulsa SPCA rescued this year is a white pit mix named Twiggy. The Tulsa SPCA cruelty investigator Tim Geen received a cruelty complaint from a contractor who had been performing work and noticed an emaciated dog on the adjacent property. Once Geen arrived, he learned the contractor had been working at the location for six weeks and the house next door was vacant the entire time.

"It is unclear why the dog wasn't noticed prior," Geen said. "But by the time we arrived, the situation was critical."

We immediately removed the dog and brought him to our clinic.

"He was an anatomy lesson," veterinary assistant Erin Johnson said. "He smiled that day. He still does, even after all he has been through."

At intake Twiggy weighed 29 lbs. and was both critically dehydrated and anemic due to a flea and worm infestation. The clinic at the Tulsa SPCA immediately began treatment and hoped for the best.

"It only took one of us to lift him into the tub," Johnson said.

The three-year-old pit mix had apparently been eating sticks and grass in the overgrown yard where he'd been abandoned for six weeks. The cruelty and clinic staff named him Twiggy for his desperate diet.

Tiner requested Tulsa Animal Welfare pursue charges against the people who abandoned Twiggy and turned in Geen's report and supporting documentation to the City of Tulsa.



Over the next several days, Twiggy started to improve. He went home with

staff each day to get extra attention.

"We put a sweater on him," volunteer manager Jessica Padilla-Hernandez said. "Both because he was shaking cold, and so people wouldn't think we were terrible. He had no body fat."



Padilla-Hernandez fostered Twiggy most nights.

"All he did for the first week and half was sleep," Padilla-Hernandez said. "He'd get up to eat and just go back to sleep. The only time he would act like a puppy was when he first woke up in the morning. He'd stretch and wake me up."

After his first 12 days in the care of the Tulsa SPCA, Twiggy had increased his weight to 42 lbs.

A few weeks later, the team found out that Twiggy's case was officially opened by Tulsa County District Attorney Steve Kunzweiler.

Kunzweiler was unable to comment for this article because the case is open.

"We are happy to say the DA has decided to take Twiggy's case," Tiner said. "While it works its way through the justice system we will continue caring for him and hope the person or people who committed this crime will be brought to justice."

"Twiggy's resilience and love for humans amazes us," Tiner said. "Because we know what he went through at the hands of someone who was supposed to love and care for him."

Twiggy now weighs 52 lbs. and is able to run, play and begin to trust humans again.

"He doesn't fit into his green sweater anymore," Padilla-Hernandez said.

Which is good news because it means he doesn't need its protection anymore either.

"I wish I could say Twiggy was the first animal we'd assisted in this way, or that he would be the last," Tiner said. "But unfortunately we know there will be more."

# Holiday Treats for Your Pets

## Calvin's Christmas Cookies (Dog Treats)

**Author:** The Scrumptious Pumpkin Blog

Yield: 18 small treats

Level: Easy

**Total Time:** 55 minutes

#### **Ingredients**

- 1 cup rye flour (or substitute rice flour or all-purpose flour)
- ¾ teaspoon baking powder
- ¼ cup unsweetened applesauce
- 2 tablespoons organic honey
- 3 ½ tablespoons olive oil (or substitute organic canola oil)
- 2 tablespoons organic dried cranberries, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons pumpkin seeds



#### **Instructions**

- **1.** Add the flour, baking powder, applesauce, honey and olive oil to a mixing bowl. Stir until well combined.
- 2. Preheat over to 350 degrees F.
- **3.** Knead dough on a lightly-floured surface and roll out to about half an inch thick. Cut treats with a cookie cutter and place on a parchment-lined baking sheet.
- **4.** Firmly press a few pieces of chopped cranberries and pumpkin seeds into the top of each cookie.
- **5.** Bake for about 12–15 minutes or until treats are firm to touch.
- **6.** Turn off oven and open oven door. Allow cookies to cool in oven about 20–30 minutes.


#### Storage

Cookies will keep for several days when stored in a covered airtight container in a cool, dry location. Cookies may also be frozen; separate treats with parchment paper and store in an upright covered container.
