Perks of an Indoor Only Cat

The average lifespan of an indoor cat is 15-20 years, but only 2-5 years for an outdoor cat.

How to Enrich Your Cat's Life Without the Outdoors

- Cats love the sun! Install perches or shelves to allow your cat more windows of opportunity.
- Give them "cat-TV" by placing bird feeders near the windows.
- Give them more room to roam by expanding upwards with kitty condos or climbing trees.
- Provide different toys, puzzles or other enrichment activities that work their minds.
- Go green cats love nibbling on plants! (be sure to check with Animal Poison Control Center first)
- Start them young! Kittens who are kept indoors are usually happy to stay there.
